# History of the Brush Valley Evangelical Lutheran Church

Brush Valley Township Indiana County PA

by Rev. J. Milton Snyder, Pastor 1901 Zechariah 1:5 "Your fathers, where are they? And the Prophets, do They live forever?"

Death is not only solemn and sad at times, but real. It bears the young and old, the high and low, the fair and lovely, the sinner and saint away as surely as the coming and going of the years. "The fathers where are they?" but sleeping in their quiet beds of earth; and "The prophets" and pastors, are lying in their midst. Thus, the generations come and go; and we also shall by and by be gathered with the dead. One of the great features of the Christian's Life is, that it has to do with earth and Heaven; man and God; the Church here and the Church there. It is a part of time: the rest embracing all eternity. The life that we live here is known to us; and partly to others: the life "hereafter" is the unknown and untried future.

Here we make a few footsteps and leave a few footprints and the weary journey is ended. It is the Christian's part to gather up the facts and the fragments that remain, work them together and make them intelligent and tangible. The Christian's task is mixed with pleasure and perplexity. It is like gathering flowers in a beautiful garden, or hunting for a rose on the Thorny Mountain. For the history of this congregation, it has been a difficult task to gather facts; as the records are few and most all local tradition is lost in the 'chaos and silence' of the past. With the meagre materials at hand we shall do the best we can.

Among the earliest Lutherans who settled in "The Wilds" of Indiana County was the family of John Conrad Rice, who removed from Lancaster County, Pa and located near the present town of Indiana in the year 1794. The home of Conrad Rice occupies a prominent place in the history of the Lutheran Church in Indiana County. For it was under his roof that the first public worship of God by Lutherans, in this county was held. To Mr. Rice's home the Rev. John Michael "Steck of Greensburg, Pa came four times a year and held services for the Lutherans of the county who could attend during 1798 and 1799. Rev. Steck may also have continued a yearly visit to this county from 1800 to 1813 as I find one recorded statement to that effect. He had served Lutheran Churches in Bedford and Somerset Counties from 1789 to 1792; when in the later year he removed to Greensburg and became a missionary in the west part of Pa. then a comparative wilderness. Rev Steck died at his home in Greensburg, Westmoreland County, July 14<sup>th</sup> 1830 in his 65<sup>th</sup> year. I added a short sketch of his life in Appendix A.

The first regular Lutheran pastor who located in this county (Indiana) was the Rev. John Gottfried Lambrecht, a graduate from the gymnasium of Gottingen, Germany. He came to the town of Indiana in the year 1813 and organized, or may possibly have re-organized the Lutheran Congregation at Indiana. Rev. Lambrecht also visited the community of Brush Valley during the years 1813 and 1814 and held public services in private dwellings in this immediate neighborhood, notably at the home of Peter Fry east of and adjoining the present church property. Among the "original settlers" of this neighborhood were the Bower's; Roser's; Millers; Fry's; Howard's; Steinman's; Keller's; Tyson's; Overdorff's; Heine's; Coy's; Cramer's; Truby's; Leininger's;

Empfield's; Creswill's; Altemus' and DeArmy's coming mainly from east of the Allegheny Mountains ranging from the years 1790 to 1815.

Rev. Lambrecht ceased his ministry here at Brush Valley July 1815. After his resignation there is a vacancy of several years, although there is a tradition that a man attempted to impose himself upon the people as a regular, ordained Lutheran Minister, during the years 1817 and 1818, but that he did not succeed.

We have next two ministers who served as supply. The Brush Valley and Indiana congregations, which now formed one pastorate, viz: Rev. William Shultz 1819 to 1821 and Rev. Moehler in 1821. We now reach the most important period in the History of the Congregation. The Ministry of Rev. G.A. Reichart and the organization of the present congregation and the erection of the old log church. Rev. Gabriel Adam Reichart became pastor of this congregation, as well as that at Indiana, August 1<sup>st</sup>, 1821. From the beginning of public services in this community about 1813 or 1814. up to the close of Rev. Reichart's ministry in 1827. The preaching was exclusively in the German; English services being introduced at long intervals, at first, by Rev. A.G. Sharretts, between the years 1827 and 1837. Within the History of this congregation of eighty odd years, three church buildings have been erected. It can not be definitely stated in what year the first building called the 'Old Log Church' was erected; but most probably during the year 1821; if not earlier; for the deed conveying the land on which it was built (now forming the main graveyard), bears the date of January 26<sup>th</sup>, 1822, and states also, that the house was then in existence. This was the first Lutheran Church erected in Indiana County; and antedates its sister Church in the Charge about nine years, as the First Lutheran Church in Indiana was completed in 1830.

The land on which the Old Log Church was built consisting of one acre was purchased of Peter Fry and his wife. Catherine for the sum of \$400; by Jacob Sorver. and John Tyson, Trustees for the congregation. The deed for this land – dated January 26<sup>th</sup> 1822 was acknowledged before John Evans, Justice of the Peace. This acre of land was part of a large tract located in what was then called Wheatfield Township and was 'surveyed by warrant dated December 31st 1773, in the name of Isaac Gray and joining lands of Obadiah Smith, John Story and others." In passing I would state that the original surveys of land in this immediate neighborhood were made by Obadiah Smith, John Story and Isaac Gray about the year 1773-75. The Smith survey was east of the Gray survey and the Story survey north of the same, the wad leading to Mechanicsburg being nearly on the line between the last two. This deed states that this 'said lot (acre) of ground was for the use of all those persons concerned as a place of public worship, on which is erected a house for said purpose, hereafter to be known as "Fry's Meeting House"; and also for the use of schools for the education of youth and for no other purpose. It was the first church erected in this part of Indiana County, the old Fry Meeting House; on the Daniel Miller farm, about one mile south of Mechanics burg, was the second church built in this part of the county. The Old Log Church was built of small logs, slightly hewed. Valentine Keller and Daniel Fry cut and hewed most of the logs as well as assisted in the building of the church. 'Chunking and daubing' were placed between the logs and hewed logs pinned to the sleepers by wooden pins made the floor. Two windows were on each side of the building, having 4 or 6 small panes of glass. So far as I can learn from the oldest living members, the size of the church was about 16 or 18 feet in width, and about 22 or 24 feet in length; and was located in the old graveyard, lengthwise along the road

leading from Nolo to Mechanicsburg – a rod or two back from the road and about midway between the two front corners of the graveyard. It was about nine feet in height; one story, the ceiling being the slab roof; the pulpit was at the east gable and the door at the west end in the center. The first pews were made of hewn slabs similar to benches. At first for heating the church they used the old open fire-hearth and log fire; but latterly used a large 'ten-plate stove'; for lighting the church at night they used the old style 'fat lamp'.

It is my opinion that Rev. G.A. Reichart organized this congregation about November 1<sup>st</sup>, 1822; or if not on this date, then on January 11<sup>th</sup>, 1823. He was a regular ordained minister of the old "Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Pennsylvania, and was commissioned and sent by This Old German Synod as a "Missionary to the Scattered Lutherans of these parts". His first ministerial act that I find recorded by himself in the German, was the baptism of twenty-two children (22) August 1<sup>st</sup>, 1822, in "The Old Log Church": The twenty-third (23<sup>rd</sup>) infant baptism recorded was performed November 17<sup>th</sup>, 1822, immediately preceded by a statement in the German, written November 1<sup>st</sup>, 1822, which I think Pastor Reichart means to stand as the Organization of the Congregation. In a footnote I give the first (10) ten infant Baptisms recorded with the date of births\*. Rev. Reichart administered the first Holy Communion he held here, in the Old Log Church, on January 12<sup>th</sup>, 1823, when seventy-four (74) persons communed. This number included four (4) members from the Congregation at Indiana and also forty-four (44) persons who were Confirmed by Rev. Reichart on Saturday previous, January 11<sup>th</sup>.

Thus, twenty-six (26) Church Members and with the 44 confirmed January 11<sup>th</sup>, seventy (70) in all who formed the first congregation and original Charter Members. Saturday, March 19<sup>th</sup>, 1825, a Catechetical Class of twenty-five (25) persons were confirmed by Rev. Reichart, whose names and births are given.

They communed with 53 Church members on the following Sabbath, March 20<sup>th</sup>, making the total number who communed on that day 78.

On Easter Sunday, April 15<sup>th</sup>, 1827, Rev. Reichart administered his last Holy Communion in this Congregation 68 members communing amongst whom were ten (10) catechumens that he confirmed on Saturday, April 14. they were:

After a ministry of 6 full years at this place, the Rev. G.A. Reichart resigned August 1st, 1827, removing to Kittaning, Armstrong County, Pa Rev. Reichart resided for the first few years of his ministry here on what is known as the "Reichart Farm" near the "Old Keller Mill". Now called "The Schreckengost

I will give a short summary of his ministerial acts in this congregation, as I have called them, and add them in the miscellaneous items, viz: - Confirmations 79; Infant Baptisms 140 odd; Funerals 10; Marriages 13.

Rev. Nicholas G. Sharretts immediately succeeded Rev. Reichart as Pastor: the pastorate consisting of the congregations at Indiana: Brushvalley and Blairsville, and later Strongstown being added. This charge was Rev. Sharrett's first and only pastorate; he resided in Indiana during his whole ministry here. He administered his first Holy Communion in this congregation Sabbath, April 6<sup>th</sup>, 1828 when 44 members communed. The first recorded Confirmation by Rev. Sharretts in this congregation took place March 1<sup>st</sup>, 1830; being six (6) in number. The following are their names and births.

About January 1, 1833, Rev. Sharretts organized The Lutheran Congregation at Strongstown with twenty-four (24) charter members: nine (9) of whom, at least, were from this congregation to form the new organization, which was made an integral part of the charge. Rev. Sharretts was the first pastor to introduce English services; he frequently preached both German and English at the same service; about every four weeks; and sometimes on Saturday's. He died at Indiana, December 31, 1836; after a ministry of nine (9) years and two (2) months. Aged 34 years, one month and 11 days. His remains rest in the "Oakland Cemetery" at Indiana, Pa. to await the resurrection of The Just. He was a good man and a faithful servant of Jesus Christ. I give a sketch of his life in the attached Appendix "B". A summary of his ministerial acts here, embraces fifty-six (56) confirmations; ninety-nine (99) Infant Baptisms and twenty (20) Marriages.

Rev. J. Brown succeeded Rev. Sharretts as Pastor of the Indiana Charge in 1837. The charge then embraced the 3 congregations at Brush Valley, Strongstown and Indiana: with most probably the Congregation at Blairsville. I find no confirmations or communions recorded in this congregation by Rev. Brown.

The Rev. Jacob Medtart followed Rev. Brown taking charge March 1, 1838. I find recorded during Rev. Medtart's ministry:

On May 28, 1842 Rev. Medtart organized the "Salem Lutheran Church" of Smicksburg. This county, whilst he also served the Plum Creek congregation. Thus, the Indiana Charge then consisted of the five following congregations. Viz:- Indiana; Brush Valley; Strongstown; Smicksburg and Plum Creek. The pastor residing in Indiana. About the year 1842 Rev. A. Babb took charge of the Blairsville congregation.

On June 13, 1840 the following persons were elected Church Officers, the first I find recorded. Elders – Samuel Wagely and George Keller; Deacons-Philip Coup and Edmund Paige. Deacons-Jacob Dearmond and Daniel Cramer. Rev. Medtart resigned here about October 1, 1842 and was succeeded by the Rev. David Adams, who took charge November 1, 1842. During Rev. Adam's ministry the propriety of building the Second Church was agitated, but owing to some business difficulties he resigned September 19, 1844 and removed, afterward engaging in the practice of medicine. I find no records of his ministry.

The "Old Log Church" after being used for its holy purposes for over 25 years was reverently taken down in the early fifties. Rev. Henry Bishop resigned November 1, 1849 and the Rev. C.J. Deininger succeeding who took charge of this and the Indiana Congregation in the early part of 1850. During his ministry here Rev. Deininger admitted eight (8) persons to church membership by the rite of Confirmation.

During the fall of 1847 the following Church Officers were elected: Elders – Adam George and George Wike; Deacons – John B. Coy, Jr. and John D. Paige.

Rev. Deininger as well as Rev. Bishop officiated in both the German and English language; supplying the Strongstown congregation with services whilst in charge here. On account of ill health Rev. Deininger resigned December 1852, and was at once succeeded by the Rev. Peter Sahm, DD.

On the 1st of January 1853 Rev. Sahm took charge of the Indiana pastorage then consisting of Indiana, Brush Valley and Strongstown; preaching his introductory sermons in the Zion Lutheran Church, Indiana January 2, 1853. English in the morning, German in the afternoon. Rev. P. Sahm preached here in both German and English about every two weeks. He administered the Holy Communion in this congregation October 2, 1953 when 96 members communed including 41 persons who were confirmed Saturday October 1.

During Rev. Dr. Peter Sahm's ministry the present Lutheran Church at Strongstown was erected. After a service of about five (5) years, Rev. Sahm resigned, February 1, 1858 and was followed by the Rev. William S. Emery, who took charge of the Indiana pastorate April 1, 1858: The Charge consisted of 3 congregations viz: - Indiana; Brush valley and Strongstown. The pastor resided in Indiana. In Rev. Emery's ministry here 19 members were received into the church 10 by Confirmation and 7 by certificate and 2 by Profession of Faith.

Rev. Emery was the last minister here to use both German and English. The Indiana Charge was divided during the last year of Rev.Emery's ministry here. The Indiana Congregation remaining alone; and Brush Valley and Strongstown separating to form a new charge to be known as the Brush Valley Charge. Thus, from their organization respectively, about November 1, 1822 and January 1, 1833. The Brush Valley and Strongstown congregations were an integral part of the Indiana Charge, to April 1861. Rev. Emery resigned the charge April 8, 1861 and the Rev. Henry Gathers became pastor at once, as supply, of the new Brush Valley Charge. He also at the same time, probably supplied part, if not the whole, of the Cookport Charge, as the Synodical minutes show he served four 4 congregations. Rev. Gathers resided in Mechanicsburg. He served Brush Valley and Strongstown, probably, every two weeks from April 8<sup>th</sup>, 1861 to March 1<sup>st</sup>, 1862. He was the first Minister here who held no German Services but preached only English. When he resigned, and was immediately succeeded by the Rev. George M. Settlemyer. Rev. Settlemyer served four congregations, viz:- Brush Valley, Strongstown, Germany and most probably Mt.Zion of the Cookport Charge. He resided in Mechanicsburg and probably served each congregation every two weeks. It is worthy of mention that during Rev. Settlemyer's ministry, Mr Adam Altemus, an aged and worthy member of this congregation willed in 1863 a thousand dollars to our Lutheran Mission in Africa.

On January 24, 1864 Rev. Settlemyer received into the congregation 3 new members by confirmation. They were Andrew Paul, Zechariah Paul and William Hite. After a ministry of 4 years, Rev. Settlemyer resigned the Charge March 1, 1866 and was followed by Rev George F. Ehrenfeld, who took charge of the Brush Valley pastorate, as a Supply June 1, 1866. He served Strongstown in connection with this congregation, as for other congregations, I cannot state since not a record line of his ministry here is given. Rev. Ehrenfeld served nearly two years resigning April 1, 1868. This congregation with Strongstown was vacant now for something over a year.

Rev. Simon P. Snyder became pastor of this, the Brush Valley charge. Coming from Blairsville, Indiana County, about December 1, 1869. Rev. Snyder resided in Mechanicsburg and he organized the present Lutheran Congregation in Homer City and he also supplied Graceton Luther Chapel and New Florence Mission in connection with the two congregations of the Brush Valley charge; he, likewise held occasional services at Mt. Zion of the Cookport charge. I do not find recorded a single act of his entire ministry here, of near five years duration.

Rev. Snyder resigned this charge April 1, 1874. He died at Van Werk, Ohio, December 6<sup>th</sup>, 1895; aged 74 years and 10 months. I give a short sketch of his life in Appendix "C".

Rev. Isaiah B.Crist – After a vacancy during the summer months, the Rev. Isaiah B. Crist succeeded Rev. Snyder, taking charge of the pastorate, November 1, 1874. He resided in New Florence and served with the Brush Valley Congregation, Strongstown, Germany, Mt. Zion and New Florence Mission. Rev. Crist remained one year resigning November 1, 1875. The charge was now vacant for near 6 months when Rev. A. W. McCullough took charge April 1, 1876. Rev. McCullough resided in Brush Valley Township; and he served this congregation, with Strongstown; and the Mt Zion congregation now of the Cookport charge for the term of two years,

preaching every two weeks. Rev. McCullough resigned April 1, 1878 and was succeeded by Rev. Benjamin W. Tomlinson, who served as a supply this congregation during the summer months of 1878. After the Rev. Tomlinson discontinued his services – Rev. A. W. McCullough, then residing in Dixonville, took charge, as a supply during part of the year 1879, serving this congregation in connection probably with Mt Zion charge. On December 6, 1879 Rev. McCullough admitted four persons into the church by Confirmation. They were:

- 1. Catherine Fisher (Baptized December 5<sup>th</sup>)
- 2. Catherine Evans
- 3. Jennie M. Murdick
- 4. (blankspace) Weaver

Rev. M.O.T. Sahm, in the Spring of 1880 followed Rev. McCullough and supplied this congregation and Strongstown with services in connection with the Mt Zion congregation and the Cookport charge. Rev. Sahm is a son of Rev. Dr. Peter Sahm, deceased, pastor of the charge from January 1, 1853 to February 1, 1858. The son served here until the fall of 1882.

# **Third Church Building**

We now reach the period of the third or present church building. On the 13<sup>th</sup> of August 1877 the trustees met at the home of Daniel Garman to consult about building a new church. They organized by electing John D. Paige, as president, M.S. Stewart, Secretary and David Garman, Treasurer. It was at this meeting resolved that the Trustees purchase a lot of ground from Peter Howard upon which to erect the new church. On the 22<sup>nd</sup> of September 1881, the Trustees of the congregation, viz: - John D. Paige, Christian R. Weaver and Lloyd Shaffer, purchased of Peter Howard, and his wife, Lucinda, for the sum of \$10.00 about one fourth of an acre of land, along the eastern line of the then church lands on which the new church was placed. Then, at a meeting of the church council held at the home of the late John Shaffer, of precious memory, it was determined that a mechanic be secured to examine the old or second church building to ascertain if it were practicable to repair the old building or best to erect a new one. Mr. John P. Kennedy was appointed to examine the old church; and he reported that it was "not worth repairing". At a meeting of the church council held August 8, 1881 it was resolved to take the necessary steps to erect a new house of worship. The dimensions to be as follows: viz: - size 30 x 45 feet, 15 feet high. Mr. John P. Kennedy was requested to draw a plan and specifications for the new church, as early as possible. On Monday August 25, 1881, the Board of Trustees consisting of John D. Paige, **Christian R. Weaver** and Lloyd Shaffer, met in the old (or 2<sup>nd</sup>) church for the writing of proposals for "Bids" for the building of the new church, which were posted at various places September 3, 1881 the Trustees compared the various bids received and they awarded the contract for building the church to John P. Kennedy for the sum of \$975.00 to be paid in three payments; the parties concerned signing an agreement to that effect. Mr. Mathias Yaney did the mason work at the new church building. On Wednesday September 20, 1882 the Contractor, John P. Kennedy and the Board of Trustees met in the new or present church building. They together examined the building, when it was pronounced satisfactory; the following is an itemized statement of the cost of this new orf present church building:

On Sabbath, October 15, 1882 the present church was dedicated to the worship of the Triune God, the "feast of dedication" was a joyous occasion. The last payment due contractor Kennedy, to the sum of \$375.00 was "raised" at the Dedication and the church stood free of debt. A large concourse of people gathered to praise The Lord for His goodness and joy filled all hearts. Rev. P.G.Bell of Indiana, this county, preached the dedicatory sermon and consecrated the church to its holy purposes. Rev. M.O.T. Sahm, pastor of the Cookport charge and Rev. J.R. Beard, a minister of the U. Presbyterian Church of Penn Run, this county, were also present, and assisted in the services. In the audience was Mrs. Sarah Sahm, the widow of Dr. Peter Sahm, once Pastor of the congregation for five years. Most probably amongst the most interested persons gathered in the audience at this dedication service were Valentine Keller and his wife, Margaret Keller, who were the only charter members of the original congregation then living. Valentine Keller had helped to build the first church, when about 13 or 14 years of age; and he now had lived to see the Third church dedicated. I call attention to the interesting fact, also, that Valentine Keller and his wife, Margaret (nee Bowers) were confirmed at the same time, with the class of 25, by the first pastor, Rev. G.A. Reichart, on March 19, 1825, Mr. Keller's 17<sup>th</sup> birthday, that was, 17 days older at the time than his wife. And that, on Sabbath morning, March 20<sup>th</sup> they together partook of the Holy Communion; the second administered in the Old Log Church by Pastor Reichart. And what a beautiful ending to relate still further that Margaret Keller, familiarly known as "Aunt Peggy" has quite recently passed to her Heavenly Home on the 17<sup>th</sup> of October 1900, at the 'good, old age' of 92 years, 6 months, and 12 days. She was the very last of the original congregation to linger on the earth, and pass over to the Church where 'the year's ne'er end'; and the congregation never breaks up. With a melancholy interest, I shall at this point, turn the leaf of history, which takes us into 'the valley and shadow' of the Church's life. I shall give some of the earliest deaths in the congregation and burials, recorded in the German. In all probability – the First burial place in this community was on the Isaac Griffith farm, now owned by the widow, Emma Simons, of Sun Cliff; it is to the left of the road leading from Suncliff to Schreckengost's Mill, and near the White Oak Tree at the foot of the first hill: 4 or 5 rods in from the road.

# Early Deaths, Interred by Rev. G.A. Reichart

The first recorded death on the church records is that of John Stephan who died October 26<sup>th</sup>, 1823. Aged probably between 57 and 58 years. Funeral text Heb 4:1.

Henry, son of John and Susanna Dunkel, born May 11, 1824. Died January 4, 1826 Aged one year, 7 months and 24 days.

Susanna, daughter of Peter and Barbara Helman, born July 2, 1815. Died June 4, 1826. Aged 10 years, 11 months and 2 days.

There are some deaths recorded that deserve more than a passing notice, first is that of Mrs Catherine Frey. She was born in York County, Pennsylvania on the 28<sup>th</sup> day of January 1759; her maiden name was Hirschinger. She died in Wheatfield Township, this county, April 18, 1831. Aged 72 years, 2 months, and 20 days. She was the wife of Peter Frey with whom she lived in matrimony 53 years 6 months and 13 days and was the mother of 12 children viz:- 7 sons and 5 daughters who were all alive at her death. Peter Frey, the husband of the above named Catherine. He was born in Windsor Township, York county, November 28, 1750. Died in Wheatfield Township, this county, May 3, 1831 but 15 days after his wife at the 'ripe age of 80 years, 5 months and 5 days. They were both interred by the pastor Rev. Nicholas G. Sharretts.

Christopher Keller, one of the oldest settlers, at the time of Brush Valley Township, died on Sunday the 12<sup>th</sup> day of May 1839, the 75<sup>th</sup> year of his age; he was buried on Tuesday, May 14, his pastor Rev. Jacob Medtart preaching the funeral sermon from Gen. 47:9. "And Jacob said unto Pharaoh, the days f the years of my pilgrimage are an hundred and thirty years; few and evil have the days of the years of my life been, and have not attained unto the days of the years of the years of my fathers in the days of their pilgrimage, But O for the touch of a vanished hand. And the sound of a voice that is still." And thus, we take up "The golden thread" that is attached to the "Leaf of History". In all probability, after the resignation of Rev. M.O.T. Sahm, in October1882, the Brush Valley charge was vacant for about one year, from October 1882, to November 1883; for I can find no reports to the contrary on the Church Records, nor in the Minutes of Synod.

The Rev. W. E. Crebs became pastor of this Congregation November 1, 1883, serving it for one year, in connection with the Homer charge, he residing in Homer City, most probably during the year 1883. This congregation was separated from the Strongstown congregation and united with the Homer charge. Rev. Crebs resigned here November 1, 1884 and was succeeded by Rev. John W. Reese, who became pastor of the Homer charge April1, 1885, and he resided in Homer City. The Charge consisted of Homer City, Brush Valley, and "

Luther Chapel of Graceton. On the 8<sup>th</sup> November, 1885 the Trustees of the congregation sold the balance of the lumber of the old or second church building for the sum of \$12.62, and this leads me to the conclusion that the old frame church was taken down during the year 1884 or 85 after being used for its sacred purpose for about 40 years. During his ministry here Rev. Reese admitted six persons to Church membership.

In the fall of the year 1885 Mr. Stephen H. Rand was employed to fence the church grounds on the East and South sides at the cost of 25 cents per panel.

After serving this congregation for 4 years until April 1, 1889, Rev. Reese resigned and was followed by Rev. J.W. Shaeffer, who took charge of the Homer Pastorate June 1, 1889, he residing in Homer City. He preached here every two weeks serving until June 1, 1891 or two years when he resigned removing to Augustaville, Pennsylvania.

Rev. W.G. Slonaker succeeded Rev. Shaeffer as a Supply to this congregation and Strongstown, during the summer of 1892. Rev. Slonaker was then a student of Theology at Susquehanna University, Selinsgrove, Pa. The charge now consisting of Brush Valley and Strongstown, was vacant for about a year when Rev. S.V. Dye became pastor, August 1, 1893rewsiding in Strongstown. In the month of February 1894 Rev. J. R. Samples assisted the pastor Rev. Dye, in a series of special services when a goodly number were moved to inquire what they must do to be saved. A free will offering was made to Rev. Sample for his services of \$20.67. The following were admitted to Church membership during the ministry of Rev. Dye.

Rev. Dye ceased his labours here April 1, 1896, when Rev., Jacob M. Hankey became pastor as a supply during the summer of 1896 and of 1897. He served Brush Valley and Strongstown in connection with Antioch of the Cookport charge, Rev. Hankey ceased his labours in the fall of 1897and Rev. Samuel A. Shaulis of New Florence took charge of the pastorate as a supply during the summer of 1898. He served this congregation with Strongstown until about November ...

Rev. J. Milton Snyder, the present pastor succeeded Rev. Shaulis taking charge May 1, 1899, removing from Tremont, Schuykill County, Pa. He resided in Strongstown and preached at this congregation and Strongstown every Sabbath. Rev. Snyder was installed Pastor August 13, 1899. Sabbath 10:00 am at Strongstown and 3:00 at Brush Valley. Revs Lewis Hay of Indiana and G.L. Courtney of Homer City preaching to the congregation and pastor respectively. During the present pastorate up to this time, the following were admitted to the church.

It is but fitting to state that in the summer and fall of 1899the ladies of the congregation held several 'festivals' to secure funds to beautify and repair the church building. They gathered the sum of \$26.17 of which was used to paper the church walls and ceiling, leaving a balance of \$13.44 which was used toward the repainting of the church. Miss Jennie Coup and Miss Gertie Murdick acted as an efficient committee in this good work by The Ladies. During the fall of 1900 the church building was repainted within and without and the present out buildings erected at a cost of \$106.00: making the total cost of repairs about \$130.00 paid cash. The pastor acting as solicitor and collector of the subscribed funds. The Decker Brothers of Penn Run, this county, doing the papering and painting by contract. All who worked so faithfully at these repairs, and gave so generously deserve full credit. Another item, worthy of record was the convening of the Eastern Conference of the Pittsburgh Synod (G.S.) October 29, 1900 in this congregation for the first time in its history. The conference met Monday evening and continued in session until Wednesday noon, October 31st, 14 Lutheran Ministers being in attendance, including Rev. J. Aberly, a Lutheran Missionary, lately returned from India. Various subjects of general religious interest were discussed, and the conference was a most enjoyable occasion.

#### Church Bell

During the month of May 1903 a "Steel Alloy Bell" was placed in the church tower, purchased of Montgomery Ward and Company, Chicago, Illinois. The bell without the fixtures or mountings weighed 605 lbs. The cost of the bell alone was \$ \_\_ Cost of fixing tower and ladder for church \$ . The Pastor, Rev. J. Milton Snyder solicited these funds and paid them out. Making his report to the congregation November 22, 1903 handing over a balance of \$2.63 to the Church Council.

#### Conclusion

My work is now done: it was a laborious task, and yet mixed with pleasure. It would have been my supreme delight to have given a full and exact sketch of this church from its very beginning until now: it was impossible to do so. The recorded facts were too few; the pastoral charges too many; and the local traditions too vague. The very best possible has been done, and we must throw the Mantle of Charity over all mistakes, since we cannot rectify them. The human pen can give only cold, naked facts; and it must leave untouched and untold the lives that were here spent; the struggles that were here endured; and the victories that were here won. The many pastors and their worshippers have passed into the 'Silent Land'. Their records and history The Angel of God Has Perfectly Kept in The Book of Life. We would not

soon, nor willingly, forget those who are gone on before us; and it best becomes us to turn over thoughts and our voices towards the God they worshipped and loved.

While we look beyond the 'blossom-starred' sky above us, we cannot forget our life duties here not the dear old church where we now worship. We dare not forget 'the venerable house – our Fathers built to God'.

Their dust endears the sod Here holy thoughts a light have shed From many a radiant face, And prayers of tender hope have spread A perfume through the place. They live with God; their beds are dust; But here their children play. And in this fleeting lifetime trust To find the 'narrow today'.

# Appendix A

In memory of Rev. John Michael Steck.

Died at Greensburg, Pa July 14, 1830. Aged 64 years, 9 months, 9 days. The Rev. Jno. Michael Steck was born at Germantown, Pa, October 5, 1765. He studied Theology under Dr. Helmuth and was admitted a member of the Lutheran Synod of Pa. In 1784 he took charge at Chambersburg, in 1789 he became pastor to the congregations in Bedford and Somerset Counties and in 1792 accepted a call from the congregations in Westmoreland County, Pa making Greensburg his residence, where he died on July 14, 1830. (Aged 64 years, 9 months and 9 days).

#### Appendix B

In memory of Rev. Nicholas G. Sharretts Died December 31, 1836. Aged 34 years, one month and 11 days. Rev. Nicholas G. Sharretts was the Eldest son of Major F. and Catherine Sharretts. He was born near Selins Grove, Union (now Snyder) County, Pa on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of November, 1802. His parents having removed to Carlisle, Pa where Nicholas, at the early age of 15 years publicly professed the Savior and was confirmed a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church. From early in life he was exercised with the desire to preach the Gospel. In this he was encouraged by his pastor, the Rev. Benjamin Keller, who prepared him for the Freshman year in Dickenson College, Carlisle, then under the presidency of Rev. Dr. Mason. He graduated in 1825. He pursued the study of Theology under the direction of Rev. J. G. Schmucker, DD of York, Pa. Having afterwards visited the Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, he was licensed to preach the Gospel by the Western Pa synod convened at Berlin, Somerset County, Pa in the fall of 1826. At that time he was appointed as Itinerant Missionary for the Northwestern part of Pa. After visiting our people in the counties of Clearfield, Venango and Indiana he accepted a call from his first and only pastorate consisting of the congregations of Indiana and of Blairsville (also latterly of Brush Valley and Strongstown, by Rev. J. Milton Snyder). He entered on his labours here (Indiana) the first day of July 1827. On the 9<sup>th</sup> October of the same year (1827) he married Miss Louisa H. Spottswood of Carlisle, Pa. A most excellent lady who was to him a noble wife and an efficient co-worker and comforter in all his toils. He was the first settled pastor and English preacher placed over this field. He served this, his people, faithfully and zealously, and most acceptably for 8 years and 6 months, when death relieved him of his labours and sufferings on earth, and took him to his reward in Heaven. He died on the last day of the year December 31, 1836. Aged 34 years one month and 11 days.

His death was greatly deplored not by his own people only, but by all. Even to this day, after the lapse of fifty years or more his name is mentioned with respect and endeared recollections by those who knew him. During a collecting tour to raise funds to free the church at Indiana (which was built during the early years of his ministry) of a debt, he contracted the disease that finally caused his death. But the summons did not take him by surprise. He could say, "I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand." His deathbed furnished delightful evidence of the power of religion to sustain the soul in the final struggle. Rev. G.A. Reichart, his co-laborer in the Gospel, at Kittaning, Pa visited him during the last few days, to whom he testified of his hope in the Savior whom he preached.

His remains were interred in front of the Church at Indiana; he had been instrumental in building, amid a large concourse of sorrowing friends, who mourned his early departure.

Rev. C.F. Heyer improved the solemn occasion by a sermon on the Text from 2<sup>nd</sup> Kings 4:26. Here his remains rested until the death of his wife, December 13, 1879 when they were deposited side by side in "Oakland Cemetery" at Indiana, Pa.

Rev. Simon P. Snyder was born February 3, 1821 in New Philadelphia, Tuscarora
County, Ohio. His father was a Lutheran preacher. At the age of 17 Rev. Snyder
united with the Lutheran Church, and began to prepare himself by a course at
Wittenberg College, to preach the Gospel. He was licensed in 1849 in Canal Dover,
Ohio. He began his ministry at Smithville, Ohio; and served at the following places;
New Castle, Indiana; Trivoli, Illinois; Camden, Indiana; Blairsville, Pa; Brushvalley,
Pa; Butler, Indiana; Shipman, Illinois; Walton, Indiana and Ohio City, Ohio. He spent
forty-six years in the service of the Master, preaching the Gospel of Peace. He died in
Van Ohio, December 6, 1895. Aged 74 years and 10 months. Published in the
Lutheran World of December 26, 1895 and transcribed by Rev. J. Milton Snyder,
December 29, 1900.
