Perhaps we had best not tell any more tales out of school as both have sons of their own and we often hear them tell their boys (all chips of the old block) how much worse the boys are to-day than when they were young so we'll believe them, of course, and hurry on to the class of 1907. Mark Harrison was the only member of the 1906 class who took up teaching.

The 1908 class, consisting of nine, was the largest class to graduate from the Hillsgrove High School, J. R. Molyneux was principal.

The '08 class had the youngest person to receive a diploma from this school. Guy Dutter graduated at the age of 13 and three years later received his diploma from the Lock Haven Normal School. He taught one year in the Shunk High School and one year at Hillsgrove. He then entered the University of Pennsylvania where he studied medicine, receiving his diploma in 1917. He served as 1st Lieutenant, at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga., during the World War, after which he was an intern in the Williamsport hospital until July 1919 when he began practicing medicine at Ludlow. Later he moved to North Girard and is now practicing at Kane.

Elda Hoffman was the only graduate to follow teaching as a profession. She was a graduate from the Mansfield State Normal School and took a special course, later, at Lock Haven and has been very successful. At the present time she is teaching at Montoursville.
